Our study involves a blend of qualitative and quantitative tools to assess the changes in the goals and means of both high-level county officials in their design of overall Realignment plans and of key ground-level actors in their immediate implementation of the new legislative mandates. The study involves three complementary projects. Collecting data and analyzing the approach California's 58 counties have taken to implementing Realignment with particular attention to capturing the key variations among the 58 county plans and how the distinct demographics, political dynamics and criminal justice and social service cultures of particular counties predict the overall approaches and key components of their plans. Interviewing the key criminal justice actors (prosecutors, defense attorneys, judges, sheriffs, probation officers) within 6-10 counties to assess their approach to and implementation of Realignment. Polling judges across California as to how they are approaching sentencing and their use of discretion post-Realignment through the use of a hypothetical survey instrument administered either in-person or via mail/email.
