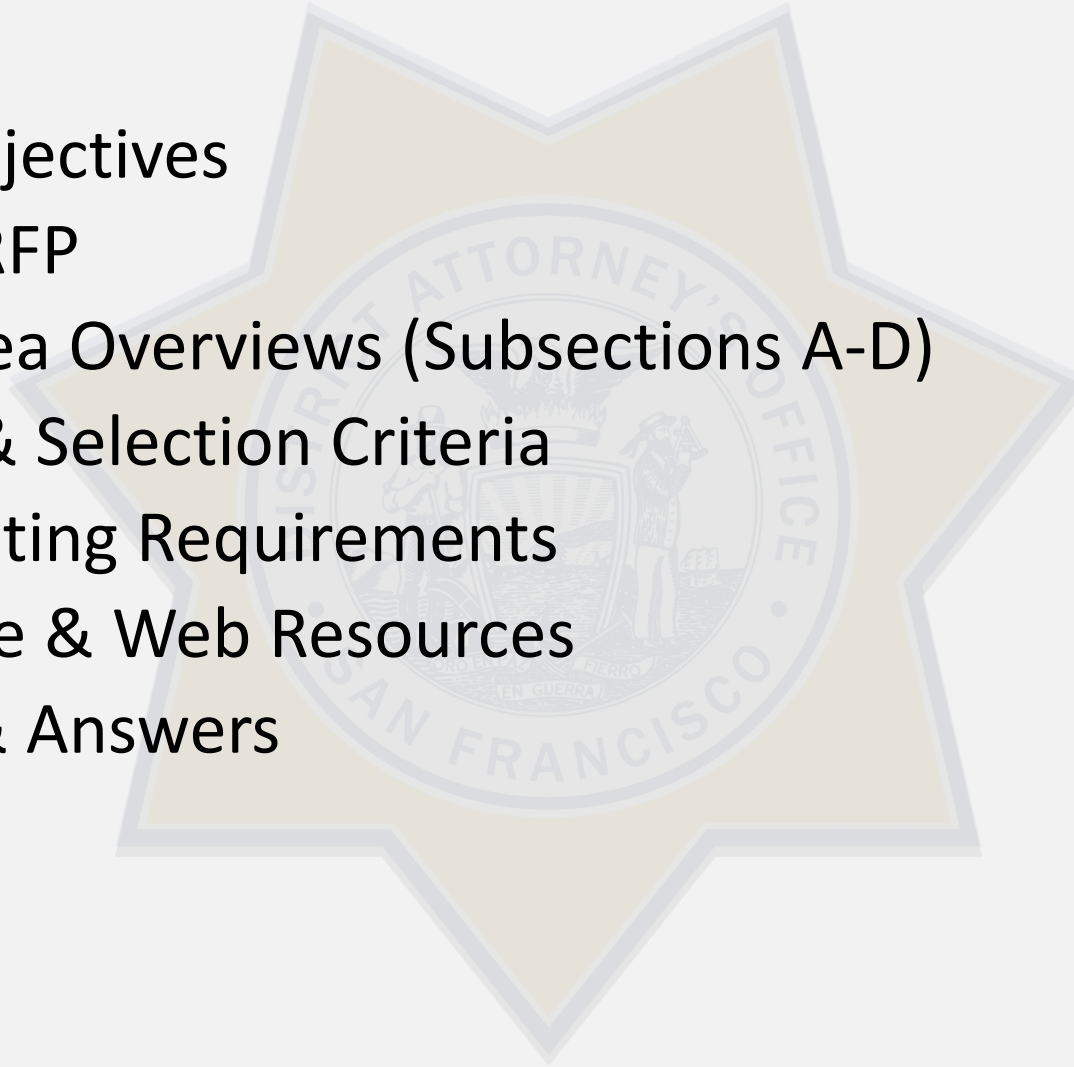

# San Francisco Healing Justice Initiative & San Francisco Resentencing Pilot Program Request for Proposals

SFDA is issuing this Request for Proposals (RFP) to identify one or more highly qualified 501(c)(3) organizations to provide key components of the Healing Justice Initiative and the California Resentencing Pilot Program.

**Healing Justice Initiative** - The SFDA seeks to fundamentally change how the criminal legal system responds to harm and ensure that individuals and communities have the tools they need to heal when harm is done.

**Resentencing Pilot Program** - In fulfillment of the California Resentencing Pilot Program, the SFDA seeks to identify a community-based organization to provide supportive services that have the most significant impact on reentry success.

# Restorative Community Conferencing (\*RCC)

## *Sub-Section A*

- Expected number of people to be served in a 12-month period: 80-100 (cumulative between all awardees\*\*)
- Anticipated Number of Awards: up to 4
- Target Population: Adults, transitional age youth (18-24 years old) and minors facing felony charges or juvenile petitions in San Francisco, harmed persons, impacted family and community members.
- Amount: \$725,000

This RFP is intended to identify organizations to provide one or more components of Restorative Community Conferencing:

- Circle Facilitation
- Accountability Plan Monitoring
- Development and administration of RJ Stipend Program for harmed persons and responsible persons

# Life Coaching

## *Sub-Section B*

- Expected number of people to be served in a 12-month period: 80-100 (cumulative between all awardees)
- Anticipated Number of Awards: Up to 4
- Target Population: TAY Transitional Age Youth (18-24 years old) Adults (participating in SFDA's RJ diversion initiatives) and minors facing felony charges or juvenile petitions in San Francisco.
- Amount: \$400,000

Life Coaching within this initiative is centered on transformative relationships between people who have committed harm and trained professionals who have similar life experiences. It aims to help people at the center of the criminal legal system gain access to opportunity and stay safe and free. The Life Coaching model involves frequent direct contact between coaches and participants, dialogue focused on self-reflection, growth, harm reduction, and coordinated support guided by careful case planning.

# Anchor Organization Focused on Building RJ Capacity in the Community

## *Sub-Section C*

- Anticipated Number of Awards: 1
- Amount: \$325,000

SFDA is seeking a community-based organization with roots in San Francisco to serve as an Anchor Organization for the development of a RJ Learning Community. Forming this community involves connecting existing RJ practitioners, offering training (either directly or through subcontracts with other organizations) to community members so that they too can become RJ practitioners, and acting as the fiscal host entity for the work of the SF Restorative Justice Collaborative, a collective of RJ service providers, community members, community-based organizations and government partners dedicated to building a Restorative Justice Ecosystem in San Francisco.



# Resentencing Pilot: Reentry Support

## *Sub-Section D*

- Expected number of people to be served in a 12-month period: 50-60
- Anticipated Number of Awards: 1
- Amount: \$ 100,000

The selected community-based organization shall have experience working with currently or formerly incarcerated individuals and their support networks, restorative justice practices, and shall have expertise in at least two of the following areas:

- (1) Supporting and developing pre-release and reentry plans.
- (2) Family reunification services.
- (3) Referrals to post-release wraparound programs, including but not limited to: employment, education, housing, substance use disorder, and mental health service programs.
- (4) Restorative justice programs

# Evaluation & Selection Criteria

The proposals will be evaluated by a selection committee comprised of parties with expertise in restorative justice, reentry, and San Francisco's criminal legal system. The City intends to evaluate the proposals generally in accordance with the criteria itemized below:

<b>Proposed Staffing (for Collaborative Proposals, includes consideration of MOU among participating organizations)</b>	<b>30</b>
